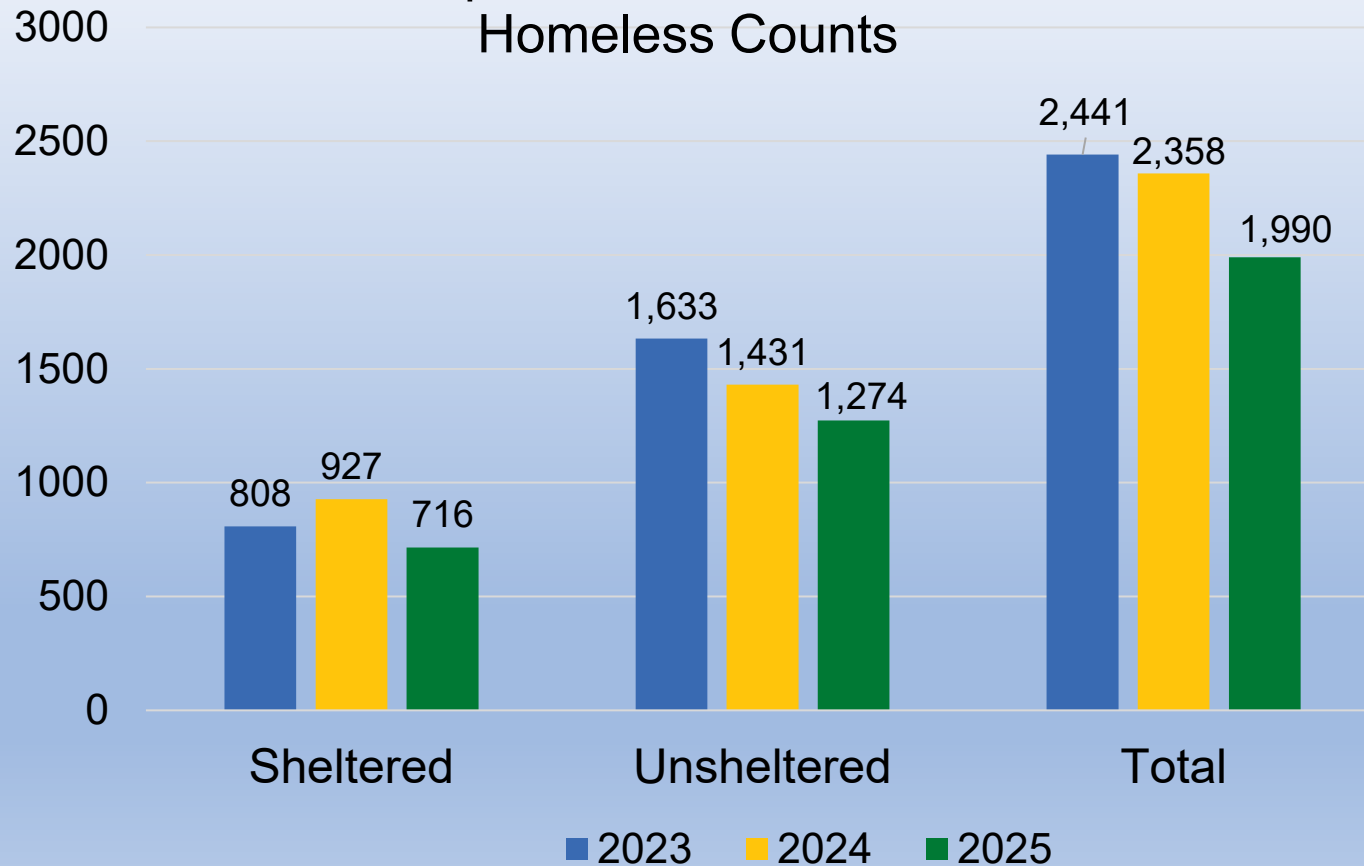




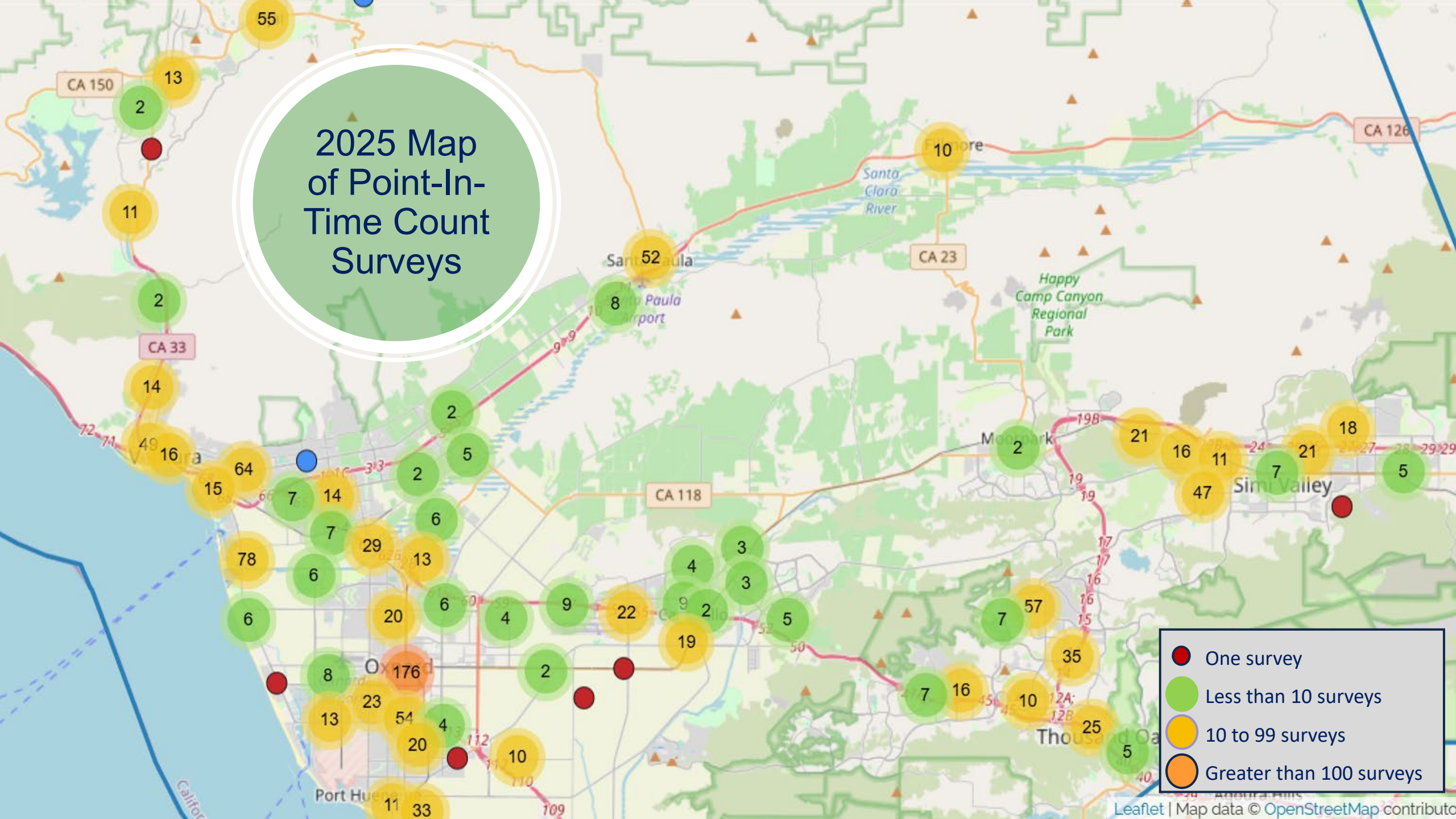
2025 Homeless Point In Time Count

Comparison of 2023 to 2025
Homeless Counts



- Overall decrease of 18.5% since 2023.
- Sheltered count decreased by 211 persons or 22.8% since 2024.
- Unsheltered count decreased by 157 persons or 11% since 2024.

2025 Map of Point-In-Time Count Surveys

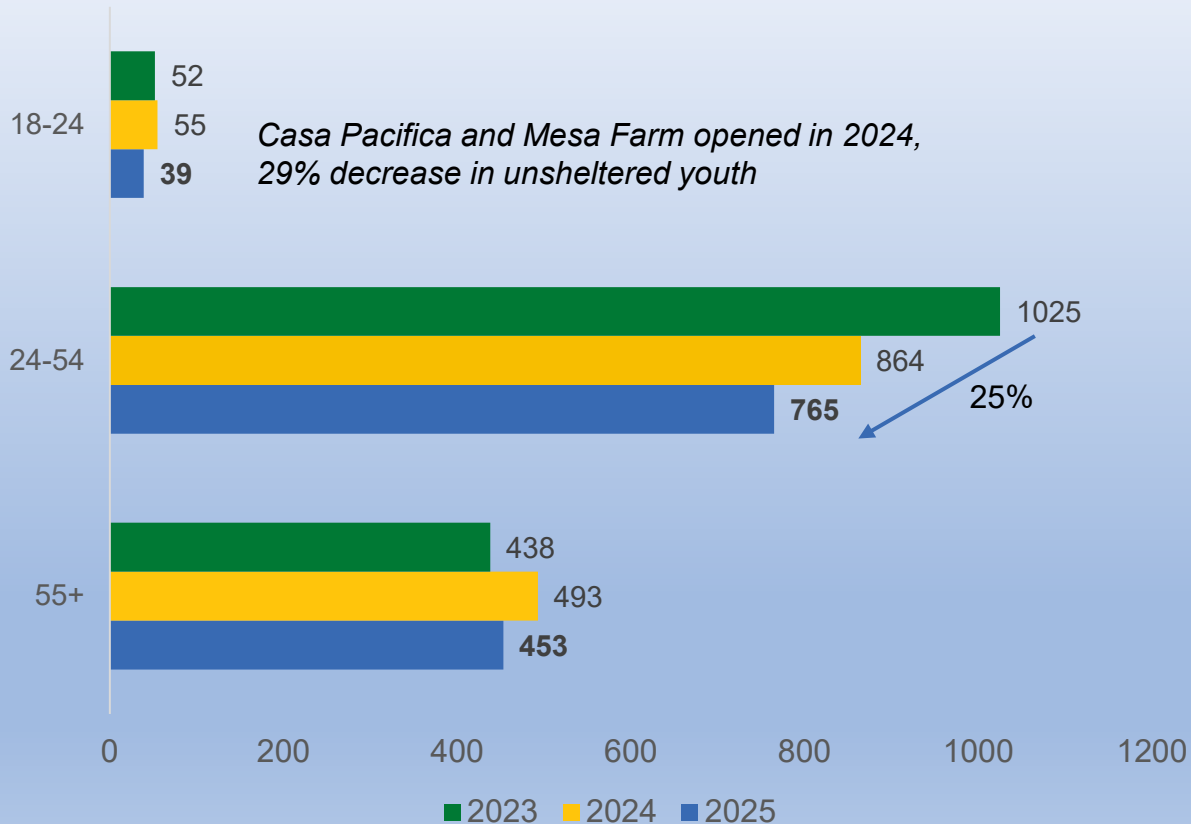


- One survey

- Greater than 100 surveys

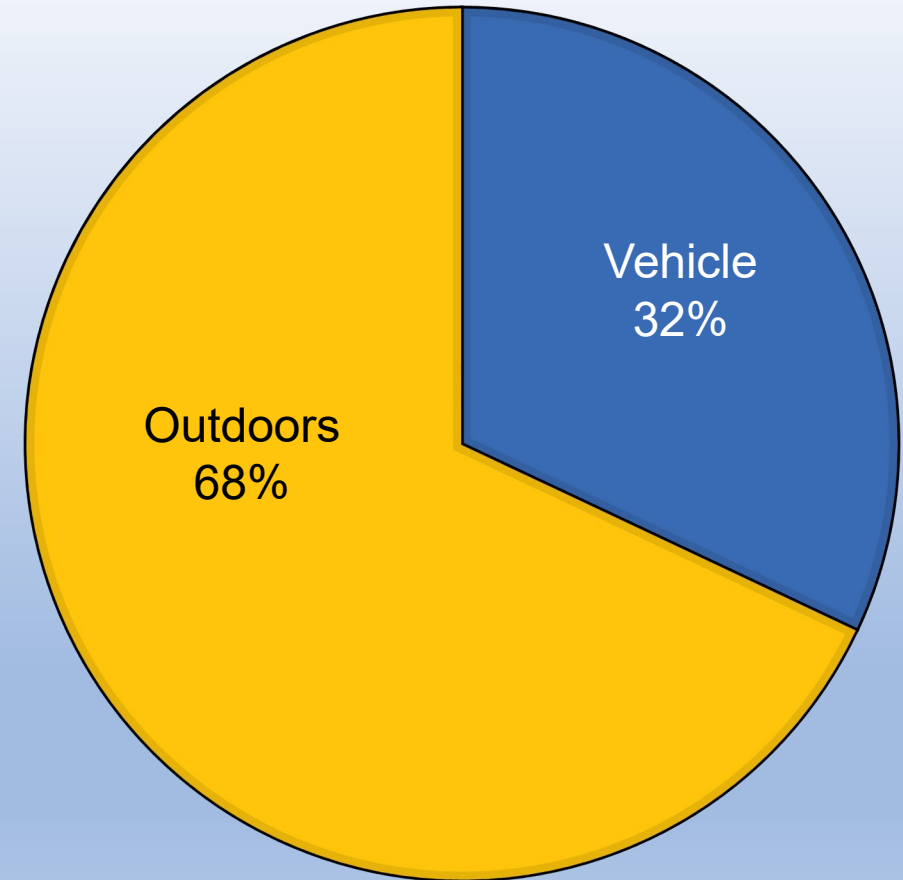


2025 Unsheltered Homeless Count Details

2 Year Homeless Count Observations

2023 to 2025 Comparison

- 34% decrease in unsheltered persons experiencing chronic homelessness (unhoused for over one year with a permanent disabling condition)
- Increase in the number of persons with history of domestic violence living unsheltered
- Ramp down of Project Roomkey and transition of interim beds to permanent housing units resulted in sheltered persons now being permanently housed reducing the sheltered count.

Progress on Housing Veterans

- 53% decrease in the number unhoused Veterans when comparing 2023 to 2025 Point in Time Count results
- Since the Homeless Count, 40 Veterans have moved in at Ormond Beach Villas and Ventura Springs, 20 are matched to those housing units pending move-in dates.
- Approximately 30 unhoused Veterans are awaiting matches to supportive housing and in some cases, referred to a higher level of care.
- 13 additional Veteran Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) units will be opening at Dolores Huertas Gardens in Oxnard scheduled for completion summer of 2025.

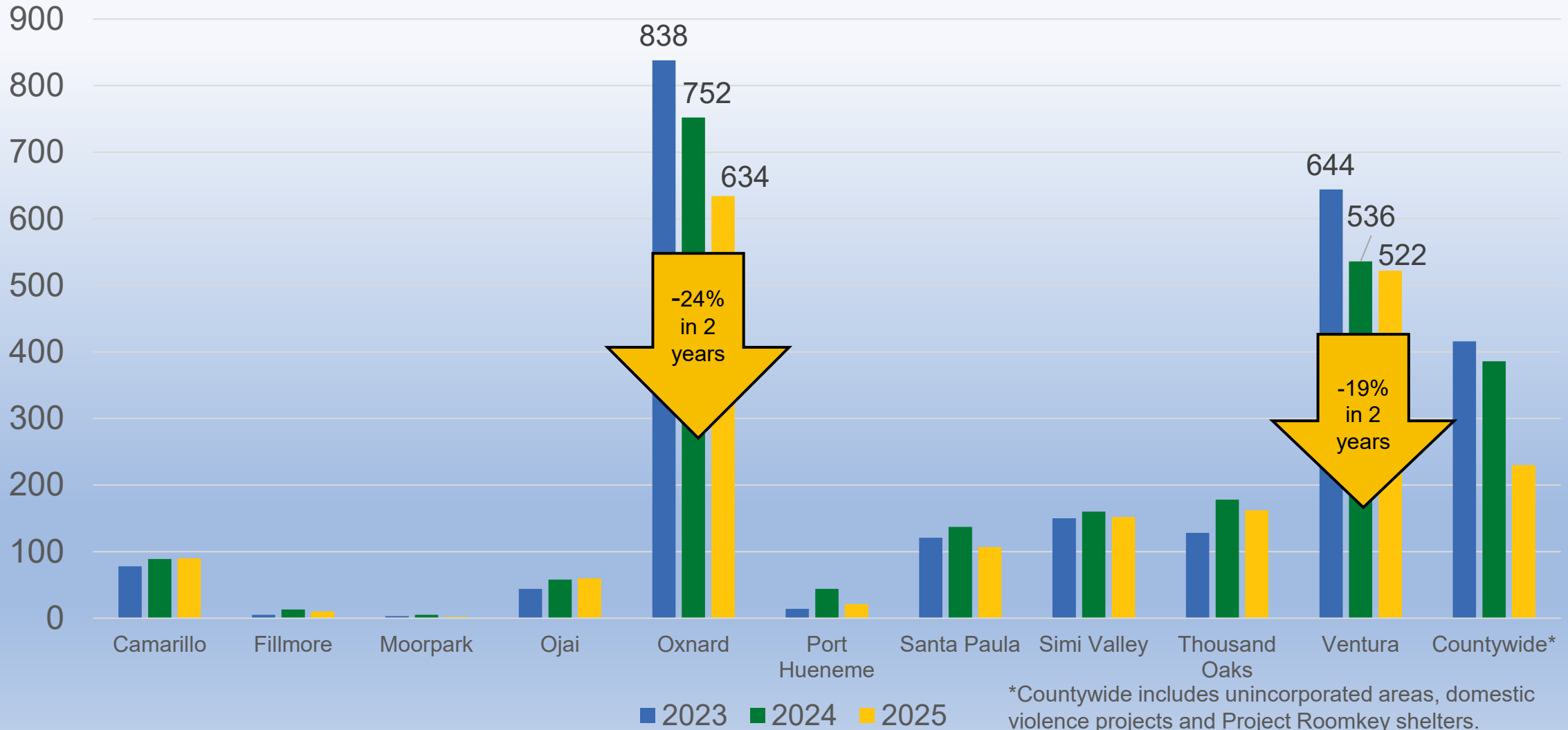

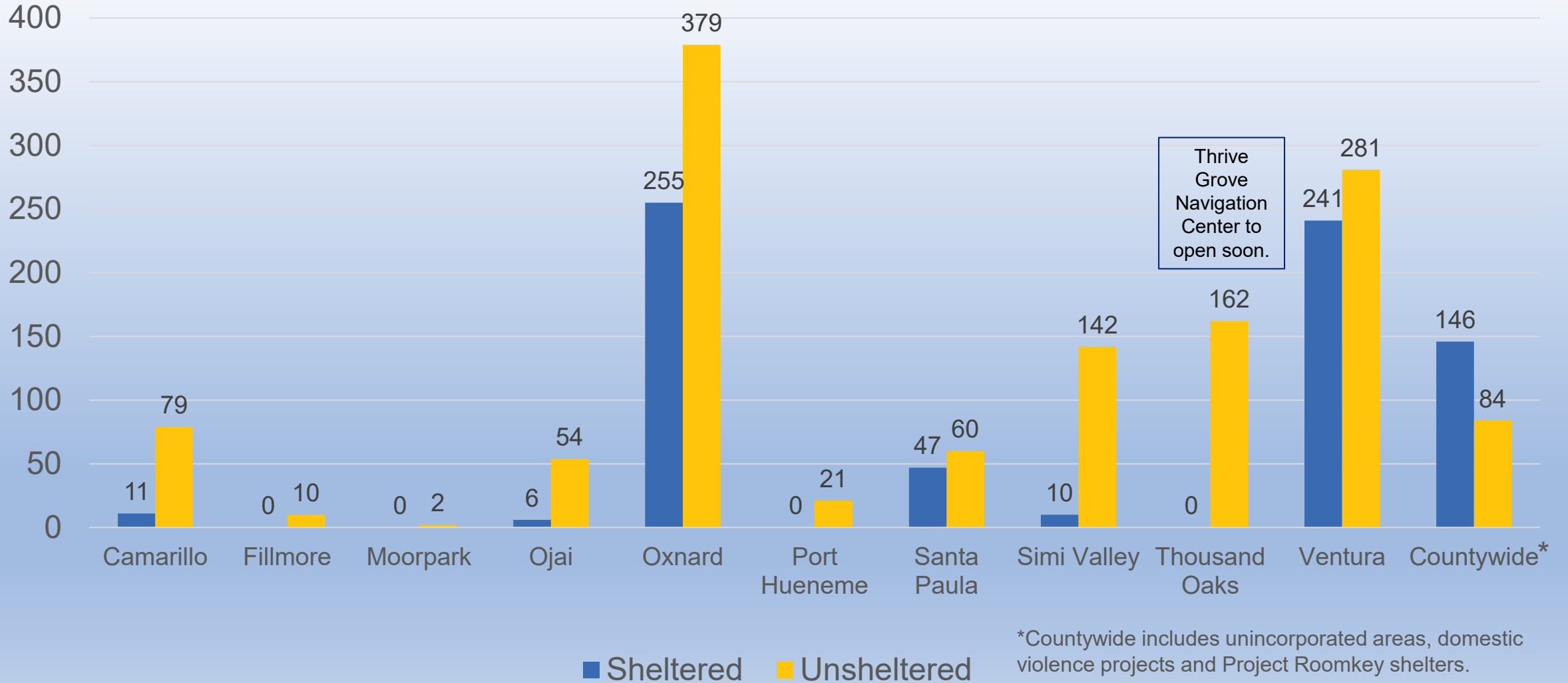


2023-25 Comparison by Jurisdiction

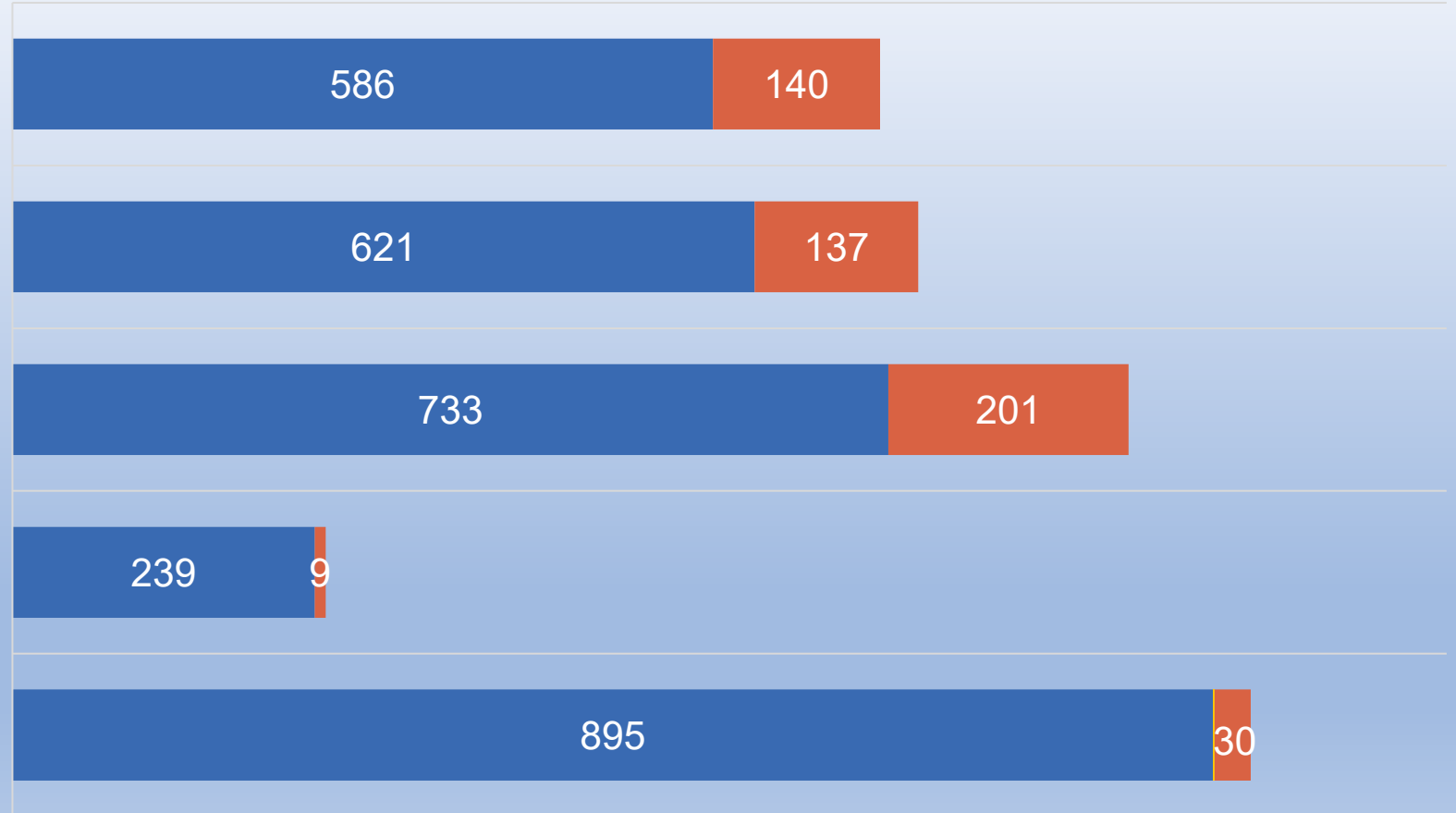

Homeless Prevention Assistance



Resources to Align with the 1:4:10 Ratio:

State Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention (HHAP):

- \$2.6M for 2 years to the Human Services Agency and United Way
- Assist 250 households @ \$7,525 each with rental assistance
- Flexible subsidies to assist 250 households @ \$1,000 each
- Provides landlord incentives and risk mitigation

Eviction Prevention

- County Executive Office to release a Request for Proposals for outreach (including development of educational materials) and legal support for tenants facing eviction.
- The Housing Rights Center regularly offering landlord and tenant workshops
